KIB provides free tools and resources, and you keep your block clean of litter on an ongoing basis. Plus, you get the awesome title "Block Captain" for leading your block's beautification.

The Adopt-A-Block program helps build communities by encouraging neighbors to participate in community activities. Street by street, neighbors inspire each other by setting an example of environmental and community stewardship, dramatically improving their quality of life. Some Adopt-A-Block volunteers also form neighborhood watch groups and improve their safety. You can become an Adopt-A-Block captain at home, at school, or where you work.

More Tips from Keep Indianapolis Beautiful

Did you know over 30% of what Americans put in the recycling bin is not recyclable? How can we improve our recycling rates through what we decide to put in the bin? Learn more below!

Know what to throw

Clean cardboard, paper, metal cans, and hard plastics such as plastic bottles and jugs can be recycled. **Tip:** If it is smaller than a credit card, throw it out.

Empty. Clean. Dry.

Keep recyclables free from food and liquid by rinsing your recyclables and throwing out soiled boxes/paper. A bottle with food residue can contaminate a whole truck of recyclables! Dirty paper and cardboard cannot be recycled. **Tip** for messy pizza boxes: Tear off the clean portions for recycling!

Don't bag it.

Soft Plastics, such as plastic grocery and sandwich bags get tangled in the recycling sorting machines. While KIB recommends bagging your regular trash to prevent litter, mixed recyclables should be dumped directly into your outdoor bin rather than containing them in a bag. **Tip:** Take your soft plastic grocery bags back to the grocery store and place them in the bag recycling bin.

Not sure if it's recyclable? When in doubt, throw it out.

Historic Column Repair Update

Last Fall, EHCO leadership won a grant from the City of Indianapolis which will allow us to rebuild and repair the historic columns around the neighborhood, including 2 on Michigan that were destroyed in car accidents in 2023.

The grant will also replace the historic marker which describes our listing on the National Registry of Historic Places. This marker sat at 10th and Dequincy but was run over last summer.

Both of these projects are underway and being well managed by past EHCO presidents Ryan Wilson and Rick McNutt.

As the historic columns crumbled over the years the yellow bricks have found themselves throughout the community. If you know of any, their recovery would be greatly appreciated.

Planning Home Improvement Projects?

Residents in Emerson Heights are eligible for the Indiana Residential Historic Rehabilitation Credit

Because it maintains so many of the originally designed structures, the Emerson Heights neighborhood was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2010, recognizing it as a prime example of a streetcar suburb. A tax credit is available to encourage the maintenance of the historic nature of the community. This credit is for Indiana state income taxpayers who undertake certified rehabilitations of historic buildings that are principally used and occupied by the taxpayer as the primary residence. The credit allows for up to 20% of total qualified rehabilitation or preservation cost. The minimum expenditures are \$10,000.
